

WHAT IS ABOUT TO HAPPEN NEXT

- **Correcting Theological Errors:** This turning point will highlight the need for theological realignment. In the quest for political influence, some believers have embraced false teachings, such as prosperity gospel or triumphalism, which promise political victories or material success in exchange for faith. Instead, this period of recalibration would restore a biblically sound eschatology—one that acknowledges suffering, hardship, and the call to endure in faithfulness to Christ as the church awaits His return.

3. A Return to Correct Eschatology

Correct eschatology, or the study of end times according to Scripture, could be another significant focus in this post-election realignment. For some time, portions of the church have focused on earthly power and political dominance as key elements of their eschatological hopes. This focus has sometimes led to a distortion of the gospel, in which political figures are seen as messianic deliverers.

- **A Purified Church:** In the process, the church may undergo a form of purification, shedding the political baggage it has carried and returning to the simplicity and power of the gospel. Just as the early church flourished under persecution and opposition, this post-political period could lead to a more vibrant, spirit-filled community of believers.
- **A Unified Focus:** This moment will unite believers around their shared faith in Christ, rather than their political affiliations. Differences in opinion will no longer be seen as divisive, as the church will be united by its mission to reflect Christ to a hurting world.
- **A Renewed Witness:** As the church refocuses on Yeshua and the kingdom of God, its witness to the world will grow stronger. No longer entangled in the systems of the world, the church will stand out as a beacon of hope, love, and truth in a world that is increasingly chaotic and divided.
